The Institute for Canadian Citizenship's biggest strength lies in our ability to connect people: we help the rest of the country get to know Canada's newest citizens. We open doors and provide new citizens with a sense of belonging and a valued place in their new home.

For the past few years, our staff and volunteers have tirelessly worked to create programs, such as Building Citizenship and the Cultural Access Pass, that introduce new citizens to special moments and amazing Canadian places, spaces and experiences. Along the way, we've gotten to know our new citizens. Always willing to share their stories — good and bad — they've taught us volumes about adjusting to life here.

Given our unique ability to connect with more than 120,000 new citizens who've participated in our programs, we decided it was time to take our conversations to the next level by bringing new citizens' voices, opinions and insights directly to the mainstream. It was time to share the new Canadian voice.

The launch of our study on new citizens' connection to Canadian sports, *Playing together – new citizens, sports* & belonging (page 20), marked a new era for the ICC, one where we can ask new citizens thoughtful questions and share their insights with a broad range of Canadians. We are now in a position to offer practical, accessible recommendations — straight from the source — on how all Canadians can foster integration.

We were delighted that more than 4,000 new citizens chose to participate in our study, and were equally thrilled by the positive response from Canada's sporting community; many told us the results validated their current efforts to be more inclusive.

In the years to come, we plan to issue more studies on belonging from the point of view of Canada's newest citizens. It's our belief that we build a stronger, more resilient Canada when the voices of our newest citizens are included in the conversation. It's our privilege to be the organization that helps make the introductions.

The past 12 months were punctuated by many other ICC successes, detailed throughout these pages, such as: Citizens in Action, a project profiling the volunteer stories of 10 new Canadian citizens through videos, portraits and short stories (page 25); our 12th LaFontaine-Baldwin Symposium, featuring cuttingedge creator Robert Lepage (page 16); beautiful citizenship ceremonies at locations of note (page 11); and registering the 100,000th Cultural Access Pass member (page 12).

This year also marks the end of my term as Executive Director of the ICC. A lot has been accomplished over the past four years, all due to the efforts of the extraordinary team we have right across the country — staff, board members, volunteers, partners, donors and supporters. 

OUR BUILDING CITIZENSHIP PROGRAM ORGANIZES SPECIAL COMMUNITY CITIZENSHIP CEREMONIES WITH COMPELLING ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSIONS.

The roundtable is unlike any other experience: community members guide informal conversations with new citizens and their families, sharing stories and collectively reflecting on citizenship and belonging.

Our ceremonies celebrate the new citizen voice; it is the focus of the roundtable discussions. New citizens excitedly talk about their journeys to start fresh in a new home and what it means — for them and their children — to live in this country and officially become Canadian.

We host ceremonies in the heart of communities coast-tocoast, often in spaces belonging to our Cultural Access Pass program partners, like Calgary's EPCOR CENTRE. Each event is a powerful opportunity to connect city builders and neighbours to their newest citizens.

The impact of these ceremonies is contagious. New citizens are thrilled to have this important day celebrated by their communities. Our volunteers and guests leave with an inspired outlook on who Canada's new citizens are and the value they place on Canadian citizenship. Everyone gains a refreshed appreciation of our country.

Building Citizenship wouldn't be possible without the network of supporters equally invested in our mandate to welcome and include Canada's newest citizens: Citizenship and Immigration Canada, our volunteer committees and roundtable hosts, organizations that donate their spaces and Tim Hortons, which generously donates coffee and snacks for every roundtable discussion.

This year, we hosted a record 37 ceremonies that welcomed 1,878 new citizens! Each event linked us to a new set of roundtable hosts, special guests and potential committee members.

PROGRAM EXPANSION

Building Citizenship continued to solidify its national presence, with our Markham, Moncton and St. John's communities successfully hosting their first ceremonies. To meet the demands of an increasing population of new citizens in the GTA, we formed additional committees in Brampton, Oshawa and downtown Toronto. These three diverse committees are made up of dynamic individuals - from business leaders to teachers and public-sector professionals, as well as new citizens sworn in at previous ICC community ceremonies.

SPECIAL GUESTS JOINING OUR CEREMONIES

This year, we were privileged to have many noteworthy Canadians join our events, adding extra sparkle. ICC Co-Founders and Co-Chairs Adrienne Clarkson and John Ralston Saul both presided over community ceremonies: Adrienne swore in new citizens during our annual ceremony with Luminato in Toronto and John swore in new citizens in Sudbury. Also joining Adrienne atop Luminato's stage in David Pecaut Square were CBC Metro Morning host Matt Galloway and Canadian journalist Noah Richler. ICC volunteers successfully recruited Maestro Fresh Wes Williams, one of Canada's most influential hip-hop artists, to give congratulatory remarks during our ceremony at Toronto's TIFF Bell Lightbox.

To help connect and inspire our volunteers, we hosted our Annual Committee Meeting, bringing together one representative from each committee for two days of networking and idea sharing. We encouraged volunteers to embrace the ambassador role by sharing the learnings and ideas we collectively generated at the event with committee members back home using an interactive package containing videos and discussion guides.

Hon. David Johnston: and in June 2014, we welcomed 60 new citizens from 25 countries as part of Toronto's Luminato Festival.

In November 2013, we hosted our first community citizenship ceremony with a professional sports team. A partnership with the Toronto Argonauts allowed us to welcome 96 new citizens from 30 countries on the field at the Rogers Centre, kicking off the Toronto Argonauts-Montreal Alouettes game. With 20,000 spectators joining the celebrations, the new citizens excitedly took the Oath led by Russ Jackson, member of the Order of Canada and the Canadian Football Hall of Fame, and sang the national anthem. The new citizens and their guests were given free tickets to stay and watch the game, many experiencing Canadian football for the first time.







OUR CULTURAL ACCESS PASS (CAP) ENCOURAGES NEW CITIZENS AND THEIR CHILDREN TO CURATE THEIR OWN CANADIAN EXPERIENCES DURING THEIR FIRST YEAR OF CITIZENSHIP.

By providing free access, CAP opens doors across the country, helping new citizens generate a sense of belonging and engagement in their communities and in Canada as a whole. Thanks to an exclusive offer from VIA Rail Canada, we also make it easier for them to travel across the country to explore their new home.

CAP members are the reason the ICC can successfully carry out our role as connectors, supporting and promoting the new Canadian voice. We rely upon this engaged network to tell us not only what they want to experience, but what they think and value. We gather their thoughts on the program to educate our partners — using their insights, we presented a panel at the Canadian Museums Association's annual conference. Their perspectives are also the driving force behind our ICC Insights initiatives (*Playing together* —

found on page 20). They are our ambassadors at our events and in our creative projects showcasing new citizens (Citizens in Action — found on page 25).

CAP wouldn't be possible without our extensive roster of attractions, partners and generous donors, like the RBC Foundation, which support our warm, inclusive welcome to Canada's newest citizens.

STILL GROWING...100,000 MEMBERS & MORE PARKS!

Our ambitious vision for CAP to become a national force has materialized. In a mere five years, the program went from having some 30,000 regional members to more than 100,000 nationwide. This year, we surpassed all previous records of membership; more than 200 people registered daily in March 2014! Our growth story also continues with our program attractions. Our roster has surpassed 1,200, thanks to Manitoba Parks adding 50 locations and Saskatchewan Parks adding 35 locations for members to visit for free.

FEEDING THE TRAVEL BUG

Our members make it possible for us to promote the new Canadian voice. Thanks to a high level of engagement with CAP, many new citizens now interact with the ICC well beyond simple program participation. This year, we launched new platforms for new citizens to share and connect with one another and our partners. During Citizenship Week 2013, we collaborated with CBC Toronto to host Culture Cafe, bringing together 20 CAP members,

This intellectual platform allows us to talk about the themes that underlie the work we do on a daily basis through Building Citizenship, CAP and ICC Insights.

Unlike most speaker series, the Symposium encourages two-way communication between the audience and our lecturers. The event consists of a keynote address followed by roundtable discussions to create an inspiring space for new perspectives and idea sharing.

Each year, we use a different lens to explore the new Canadian voice. Although our speakers may not have a direct immigrant narrative, their work and life experiences allow them to express themes and perspectives that offer different views on this topic. To ensure the new citizen voice is present, we invite 15 Cultural Access Pass members to attend as our ambassadors and offer discounted tickets to all CAP members.

PLAYING TOGETHER — NEW CITIZENS, SPORTS & BELONGING

As the World Cup was ending and Toronto began its countdown to the 2015 Pan Am/Parapan Am Games, we released our country's first national study on new citizens' connection to Canadian sports.

Playing together — new citizens, sports & belonging captures firsthand accounts from more than 4,000 new citizens — members of our Cultural Access Pass program collected from a national online survey and cross-country focus groups. New citizens shared what they're playing and watching, what's keeping them on the sidelines and if sport can be used as a mechanism for integration.

This study shows us how easy playing together can be if we remove the assumption that everyone knows how it's done. We heard from sports organizations across the country: some asked for more information; many thanked us for validating their efforts to be inclusive.
