Web survey using computer-assisted Web interviewing (CAWI) technology.



1,519 Canadians were interviewed through a Leger Omnibus survey. 2,013 New Canadians were interviewed from ICC's New Canadians Panel.



Between February 25 and 27, 2022 for Leger's Omnibus survey. Between February 24 and 28, 2022 for the New Canadians Panel.

METHODOLOGY

Leger Canada Omnibus and ICC New Canadians Panel



Using data from the 2016 Census, results were weighted according to gender, age, native language, region, education level and presence of children in the household in order to ensure a representative sample of the population.



Canadian Immigration Policy

Overall, most Canadians and new immigrant Canadians alike believe that Canada provides immigrants with a good quality of life, but there are some discrepancies between the opinions of Canadians and new Canadian immigrants; Canadians have a much more positive outlook on Canada's immigration policy compared to new Canadian immigrants who are more likely to believe that Canadians don't understand the challenges that immigrants face and feel the rising cost of living will make immigrants less likely to stay in Canada.







New Canadian immigrants from the west tend to generally have stronger positive opinions about Canadian immigration policy – especially when it comes to their views on fairness and job opportunity; whereas those with university degrees tend to have less favourable opinions on matters related to fair job opportunity and pay.



Trucker Convoy & Feelings of Canadian Pride

Canadians are significantly more likely than new Canadian immigrants to feel less proud to be Canadian as a result of the Trucker Convoy. Immigrants on the other hand are much more likely to feel indifferent.




Has the trucker convoy made you more or less proud to be a Canadian?

Trucker Convoy & Feelings of Canadian Pride

The trucker convoy has made more than half (55%) of Canadians feel less proud to be Canadian. Those who feel less proud tend to skew older, university educated and reside in Quebec. Almost a quarter (24%) feel the same/indifferent and the (16%) who feel more proud to be Canadian tend to be younger, male and less educated.



Trucker Convoy & Feelings of Canadian Pride

The trucker convoy has made most new Canadian immigrants either feel indifferent or less proud to be Canadian. Those who feel less proud tend to be 18-34 or 45 years +, university educated and live in the West or Ontario. Those who feel the same/indifferent are more likely to be 35–44 and live in Quebec.



Trucker Convoy & Feeling Welcome in Canada

When asked if the trucker convoy made new Canadian immigrants feel more or less welcome in Canada, more than half (56%) said they feel the same. A quarter of them said they feel less welcome – and these people tend to be younger (18–34-years-old), university educated and live in Ontario or the west.

Canada Meeting Expectations

The majority of new Canadian immigrants feel that Canada is meeting their expectation on safety, quality of life, and a place to raise kids.



Seeking Canadian Citizenship

Almost all (94%) of new Canadians are already Canadian citizens. Those who are currently seeking citizenship are more likely to be from Quebec.







... Reasons for Not Seeking Canadian Citizenship

Only a very small number of new Canadian immigrants said they are not seeking Canadian Citizenship. The most common reasons for this include associated costs, heavy government taxation and dissatisfaction with the current healthcare system.



Recommending Canada for Immigration

Almost 90% of new Canadian immigrants would recommend others move to Canada. Older Canadians and those with less education appear to willing to recommend Canada without hesitation, while younger university graduates are willing to recommend, but with some reservations.





... Reservations about Recommending Canada

For those willing to recommend Canada but with some reservations – those reservations tend to be related to high cost of living and challenges tied to work and education.





Plans on Moving to Another Country

More than half (57%) of new Canadian immigrants have no plans of moving to another country. Those who are older (55+) and less educated are least likely to want to move, while younger (under 44 years old) new Canadians are more likely to say they want to move.
